4-H Portfolios:

This is an accumulation three years of 4-H project work in a major project area. Records are submitted in age categories of 13-15 and 16-18. These books are due in the county 4-H office in early February. State winners receive cash awards. Contact: Shannon McCollum, shannon-mccollum@ncsu.edu

Record Books and Portfolios are due into the Randolph County office in January of each calendar year

4-H Project Records:

Records highlight what 4-H'ers have learned and done in a specific project area for a period of 12 months. The books are judged in age categories of: 9-10, 11-12, 13-15 and 16-18, Cloverbuds (ages 5-8 years old as of January 1) may also turn in a project record book, but these books are not judged. Project Record books are due in the County 4-H office at the Volunteer Leader Association (VLA) meeting in January. 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4-H Presentations and Public Speaking:

This competition allows you the opportunity to present information by demonstration or illustrated talk for



competition. The time limit is generally between 5 and 12 minutes, with specific time regulations in specific categories. 4-H'ers are selected to compete at district competition through county competitions.

State 4-H Council Conference:

Delegates have the chance to participate in interactive workshops, improve their leadership skills and learn with others from across the state This event is usually held in November as the kick-off event introducing the new state theme to 4-H members. Workshops and activities are taught by district and state officers as well as outside presenters and focus on the state theme.

4-H State Council Officer:

A 4-H member is eligible to run for State 4-H Office if he or she is at least 16 years of age as of January 1 of the year of nomination, and if he or she has been an active 4-H member for at least three years prior to seeking office. They Cooperate with the state 4-H Youth Development Department in planning the State 4-H Council Conference and the North Carolina 4-H Congress. The Council will enforce the constitution and the bylaws. The Council will also advise the State 4-H Youth Development Department staff concerning a general evaluation of the 4-H program. 4-H Congress:

Normally held in July, NC 4-H Congress is a four day culminating event event for the 4-H year. The event is geared for teen 4-H'ers ages 13-18; however, junior 4-H'ers may attend part-time if they were named district presentation winners. Congress is held on the campus of NC State University. Activities of the week include: state presentation finals, Honor Club tapping, state-level hands-to-service project, State 4-H Council officer elections, banquets, dances, engaging workshops, and more. Citizenship Focus:

Hands-on workshops, panel discussions, distinguished speakers and open discussion will help youth discover how government impacts your everyday life, and how you can impact government in return. 4-H'ers will learn about state government, learn about working with public officials, hear from prominent NC officials and visit legislators. 4-H District Officer:

Candidates for district office must be at least 14 years old and have been an active 4-H member for at least two years. A person may only serve as a district officer once. http://www.nc4h.org/youth/statecouncil/ Contact: Sarah Kotzian, sarah kotzian@ncsu.edu

Winterfest:

A district day event with 4-H workshops and a unique team building experience. Location depends on agents advisors. Typically takes place in January (weather permitting). Open to ages 13+. Intent to run for District Officer occurs.

Teen Retreat:

We are in the North Central District. Typically, an overnight event at a 4-H camp and includes workshops, community service project, dance/social. Voting for your 4-H District Officer takes place. Typically takes place March. (ages 13+)

District Activity Day:

County presentation winners compete against 4-H youth in their categories at the District level. Locations vary year to year within the district. District winners advance to State competition. There are awards and prize monies available at the District and State level. Typically held on a Friday in June. (Ages 5+)

4-H Electric Congress:

Annual awards and educational event that recognizes youth that have excelled in the Electric Program. Travels from region to region of the state. Participate in educational workshops. Meet Power Company representatives. Fun Activities. Always either UNC Wilmington, UNC Charlotte, or Western Carolina. One recreational event is included. 4-H Summer Camp:

Randolph County youth typically attend Betsy Jeff Penn 4-H Camp as it is in our district and attend Sunday – Friday, weeks vary year to year. A deposit is required in October of the previous year to hold the youth's spot. Both residential and day 4-H camping programs have a rich history of providing educational programming to thousands of youth annually through hands-on, experiential learning. Through participation in the 4-H camping program youth: Understand that learning can be fun. Improve communication skills. Acknowledge their abilities and limitations and develop skills and options for growth. Learn about various sciences and develop scientific skills. Gain an understanding and appreciation of different cultures and the value of diversity in a global society. Learn about the natural environment and improve stewardship skills. Improve their physical skills and fitness. Learn a process for solving problems and working cooperatively in groups. Learn skills to set goals and make decisions individually. Learn to identify and manage resources. Experience a variety of life-long recreational activities. Learn and practice ethical behavior. Explore spiritual values.

NC 4-H Horsemanship Camp:

The North Carolina 4-H Horsemanship Camp is held in June of each year. Improve your horsemanship skills while having fun with other 4-H'ers. A highly qualified camp staff will introduce the beginning rider to the basics of horsemanship while advanced riders can learn new and better horsemanship skills and showing techniques. AIRE:

Due in State 4-H Office May 15. Applications must be at least 14 years old as of January 1. This program is used to select the delegations to attend National 4-H Congress, National 4-H Conference and the International Leadership Conference. Participants must complete a two-page application and submit a resume of no more than two pages and an Essay on How 4-H Has Impacted Their Life. The resume should highlight the 4-H'ers achievements, project work and leadership throughout their career. The County 4-H Agent must sign off on the application before it is submitted. Interviews are held in conjunction with NC 4-H Congress. Winners are announced during 4-H Congress. Contact: Mitzi Downing, mitzi downing@ncsu.edu

Youth participants selecting Option 1: Are required to submit their AIRE portfolio to their local 4-H agent prior to the state submission deadline. Please contact your local 4-H agent for your county submission deadline

North Carolina 4-H Honor Club:

Membership in the North Carolina 4-H Honor Club is bestowed upon those 4-H'ers who have exhibited outstanding 4-H citizenship and leadership throughout their 4-H career. An Honor Club member continues to provide leadership and service to the total 4-H program throughout life.

College Scholarships:

High school seniors may apply for 4-H scholarships. The application must be postmarked by February 1. One application form is completed if applying for one or more scholarships. Several of these scholarships are restricted to youth that meet certain criteria. The County 4-H office receives information on these scholarships in early December.
