4-HONLINE ENROLLMENT

REQUIRED ANNUALLY FOR ALL PARTICIPANTS

WHO?

All participants - youth and adult volunteer - who intend on participating in 4-H activities, events, competitions, meetings, etc in the 2025 calendar year.

WHAT?

All participants must enroll/re-enroll annually. If you previously created a profile using 4-HOnline, you must reenroll each year before participating in 4-H activities and events.

WHEN?

Starting January 6th, 2025 4-HOnline will re-open for annual enrollment/re-enrollment. While you may complete enrollment at any time during the year, it's important to remember that youth and adult volunteers must complete this process prior to participating in 4-H activities and events.

WHERE?

WHY?

4-HOnline is the online platform utilized statewide. It is the online database for storing important emergency contact information, need-to-know medical information, background screening information, and more. It is also the platform used for registering for various NC 4-H events



IMPORTANT TIPS:

- If you have an existing 4-HOnline profile, you should not create another profile.
- All shooting sports club participants MUST select a shooting sports project when prompted and sign the required safety waiver.
- If selecting a club to participate in, you should always contact the club leader using the contact information available on our website. If you do not contact the club leader, they will not know to contact you and your youth regarding important club meeting information.

FAOS:

"What if I've moved counties? Should I create a new account to indicate this move?" No - you should keep the same profile you previously created and contact 4-H staff in your new or former county to assist you.

"I can't remember my password and I'm unable to reset it. Should I create a new profile?"

No - instead, contact your county 4-H staff to assist you in resetting your password.



NC 4-H Honor Club



The NC 4-H Honor Club is a prestigious recognition program for 4-H members in North Carolina who have demonstrated exceptional leadership, service, and commitment to the 4-H program. It is designed to honor individuals who have shown outstanding achievement in both 4-H and their community their projects involvement. Membership is typically achieved through a nomination and selection process that highlights qualities such as responsibility, citizenship, and dedication to helping others. The Honor Club provides an opportunity for members to connect with other leaders across the state and engage in activities that promote further personal growth and leadership development. It serves as both acknowledgment of accomplishments and a catalyst for future leadership within the 4-H community.

Applications for 2025 are due February 3, 2025 at 5pm.


