From hands-on science experiments to culinary adventures, local youth had countless opportunities to learn and grow. Students at McCrary Elementary explored the power of potatoes—discovering how they conduct electricity, planting their own to observe growth, and learning different ways to prepare them. Young chefs at George Washington Carver Enrichment Center practiced their cooking skills by making two types of healthy cookies, mastering measuring, zesting lemons, and teamwork. Tiny Turf Homes took root at Uwharrie Charter Academy and Trogden's Afterschool Care, where students learned what plants need to thrive while creating their own mini gardens. 4-H'ers at Seagrove Library got to know North Carolina's native birds and crafted bird feeders, while Southmont Elementary students explored the wonders of butterflies and soil. 

Step Up, Speak Out!



Public speaking is a skill that lasts a lifetime! District Activity Day gives youth the chance to build confidence, share their passions, and compete in a fun, supportive environment. Plus, top presenters can advance to the state-level District Activity Day is your chance to take the stage, showcase your knowledge, and gain skills that will set you up for success!

Participants prepare and deliver a presentation on a topic of their choice—ranging from science and agriculture to cooking and creative arts. Youth can compete in a variety of categories, with presentations typically lasting 5-12 minutes, depending on age.

This event is open to all youth ages 5-18, and winners at the district level may qualify for the state competition. Presenting at DAD is a fantastic way to build communication skills, practice research and organization, and receive valuable feedback from judges. Whether your child loves sharing what they know or is looking to overcome stage fright, this is a great experience for growth and learning!
